Hepatitis A Update

The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health declared a communitywide outbreak of hepatitis A virus infections in Los Angeles residents in May 2025. The infection is caused by the hepatitis A virus, which is found in the stool of those who are infected. Hepatitis A virus is contagious through the fecal-oral route and spreads through close person-to-person contact and eating contaminated food or drink.

Historically unhoused individuals have been at higher risk for contracting hepatitis A infection because of limited access to handwashing and toileting facilities. Most hepatitis A infections in 2025, however, have been among people without risk factors such as travel or being unhoused.

Take Action



Vaccination is the best way to prevent infection. Public Health recommends that LA County residents take the following actions to help prevent the spread of disease:

- Check if you have been **vaccinated for hepatitis A**. If you haven't, contact your medical provider to get vaccinated. Vaccination is the best way to prevent hepatitis A and should be a covered benefit under most health insurance plans.
- **Wash your hands** with soap and water before eating and preparing food and after using the bathroom.

SPA 6 Men's Health Survey



The Men's Health Initiative is a new Initiative that aims to bring awareness to the **health disparities affecting Black men at an alarming rate**. Black men have to lowest life expectancy and highest death rate among any demographic group in the United States, and many of the health issues are preventable.

Our team is actively out in the community assessing the health and wellness needs of Black men, as well as providing education and resources to facilitate a healthier lifestyle.

We have formulated a health survey to obtain health history, as well as any social determinants that may affect their decisions when seeking health care. We have attended numerous health and wellness events and engaged in community outreach to share or survey with the community. Ultimately, our goal is to start a Men's Health Department within L.A. County

Measles Update

Public Health Encourages Measles Vaccine as Cases Increase in LA County and Summer Travel Begins

The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health is alerting residents of an increase in measles cases among people who have recently traveled internationally and domestically. With measles outbreaks happening both in the United States and internationally, an increase in cases in our county highlights how important it is for residents to get protected before residents begin making summer travel plans. Public Health encourages all residents to get protected by receiving the measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine if they are not immune.

“Measles is a serious respiratory disease that spreads easily through the air and on surfaces, particularly among people who are not already protected from it,” said Muntu Davis, MD, MPH, Los Angeles County Health Officer. “A person can spread the illness to others before they have symptoms, and it can take seven to twenty-one days for symptoms to show up after exposure. Measles can lead to severe disease in young children and vulnerable adults. As LA County residents begin to travel this summer and with measles cases increasing among those who have recently traveled, we remind everyone that the best way to protect yourself and your family from infection is with the highly effective measles vaccine.”

Public Health has confirmed a measles case in a visitor who traveled to Los Angeles County recently from abroad. This is the fourth confirmed case of measles in a Los Angeles County resident or visitor this year. The traveler was not infectious during the time of travel. At this point, there are no public locations in Los Angeles County where others may have been potentially exposed, outside of healthcare facilities who are directly contacting their own exposed patients and staff. Public Health is identifying others who may have been potentially exposed and taking steps to confirm if they have been vaccinated against measles.

Public Health encourages all residents to:

- Review their immunization and medical records to determine if they are protected against measles, especially before international travel or domestic travel in [areas experiencing measles outbreaks](#). People who have not had measles infection or received the measles immunization previously are not protected from the measles virus and should talk with a health care provider about receiving the measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) immunization.
- Contact and notify their health care provider as soon as possible about a potential exposure if they are pregnant, an infant, have a weakened immune system and/or are unimmunized regardless of vaccination history.
- If symptoms develop, stay at home, and avoid school, work and any large gatherings. Call a healthcare provider immediately. Do not enter a health care facility before calling them and making them aware of your measles exposure and symptoms. Public Health can assist health care providers in appropriately diagnosing and managing your care.

Community Health Stations

Public Health Introduces Community Health Stations to Provide Lifesaving Products

The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health has launched 51 Community Health Stations to provide residents with free lifesaving overdose prevention and public health supplies. The self-serve vending machines will provide underserved communities across LA County with easy access to lifesaving resources.

The Community Health Stations provide the following products:

- **COVID-19 Self-Test Kit:** One box containing two tests.
- **Naloxone**, a life-saving medication that can reverse an opioid overdose: One carton containing two single-use devices in blister packages and instructions for use.
- **Fentanyl Test Strip (FTS) Kit:** One FTS kit containing five individually- packaged strips and instructions for use.
- **External Condoms (FDA standard):** One package holding five external condoms and five non-spermicidal lubricants.
- **Internal Condoms (FDA standard):** One individually wrapped internal condom and instructions for use.

“COVID-19 self-tests, naloxone, fentanyl test strips, and condoms allow individuals to take actions that protect themselves and others in the community,” said Dr. Barbara Ferrer, PhD, MPH, MEd, Director, Los Angeles County Department of Public Health. “Having free public health supplies available to residents seven days a week through the self-service Community Health Stations makes it easier to access important products that support health and save lives.”

CHW Spotlight

Maria Acevedo



This month we are proud to spotlight one of our most dedicated and inspiring team members Maria Acevedo. Maria is a Supervising Community Health Worker who has served our county for over 30 years. With decades of experience and a deep commitment to community well-being, she brings compassion, wisdom, and guidance to everything she does.

Can you share a bit about your background and what lead you to this role?

MA: I had other plans for myself and took a typing class, and a shorthand class because I wanted to be a secretary or a Stenographer. My first job in the county was with Department of Public Health as typist clerk for the Child Health and Disability Prevention Program, headquartered at Harbor/UCLA. I worked there for a little over 12 years. Part of my job was also to go to the hospital to schedule babies First Well Baby appointment at the different county clinics. While working there I realized that I enjoyed working with people more than sitting behind a desk. When the Community Health Worker position opened, I applied, and I was hired at the Torrance H.C. to work with Tuberculosis patients providing Direct Observed Therapy (DOT) as well as assist in the STD clinic, I did that for over 20 years. After seven years the county made changes, and they hired LVN's to do the CHW's job and we were assigned new tasks. Our main focus would now be working with the community in the field, tabling in outreaches, and give presentations.

Tell us about the SPA you serve and the community partnerships you have developed.

MA: I serve in SPA 6 and we have partnered with schools, libraries, churches, senior centers, and other organizations.

What issues do you most address in your role and what changes would you like to see in the field of community health work to better support those efforts?

MA: The challenges that we have encountered when working in the field is when there are conflicting or ongoing changes with DPH messaging or information that is shared. For example, COVID-19, there were always changes so the people didn't know to whom or what to believe.

How do you collaborate with other health professionals or organizations?

MA: When we participate at the different events we network with other vendors and exchange business cards. The other organizations will then inform us of upcoming events such as Mental Health Fair, Homeless Health Fair, Black History Celebrations, just to name a few. They will also invite us to do presentations on specific topics.

How do you build trust with individuals and families in the community?

MA: We build trust in the community by speaking to them in their own language or at least attempt to. When we listen to them and when we keep our word, if we tell them that we will get back to them with specific information we must make sure that we do just that. They trust us when they see that we are part of the same community and that we understand them.

The MLK Healing & Trauma Prevention Center

The MLK Community Healing and Trauma Prevention Center, also called the "Healing Center," serves children, families, and individuals with a continuum of services designed to strengthen families and promote individual wellbeing. The Healing Center serves SPA 6, including the South LA communities of Watts, Willowbrook, and Compton. It's located in the MLK Center for Public Health. Available support includes mental health, substance use, and general health and wellness resources.

All activities are FREE and open to the community.





Speakers' Bureau

Outreach Services

1. What is the Speakers' Bureau?

The Speakers' Bureau is a service of the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (DPH) that facilitates requests from the community for speakers on various Public Health topics.

Trained DPH staff are designated by their supervisors to conduct community presentations. Some of the diverse audiences we serve include, but are not limited to, community-based organizations, students (elementary, high school and college-aged), faith-based groups, health professionals, Los Angeles County employees, and parents.

2. What are the Speakers' Bureau Services?

The following services are available through the DPH Speakers' Bureau:

Speaking Requests:

We facilitate speaking engagements at the following type of events:

- Community Meetings
- Conferences
- Health Fairs
- Professional Meetings

Community Outreach:

The Speakers' Bureau also serves as a centralized location for coordinating DPH county-wide outreach activities. Through our tracking system, we can respond to and track various outreach activities that are conducted throughout Los Angeles County.

Emergency Response:

During public health outbreaks and emergency response situations, the Speakers' Bureau also serves as a centralized service for coordinating requests from community members and organizations requesting presentation on emerging public health topics. Topics we have responded to in the past include COVID-19, H1N1, Hantavirus, Tuberculosis, West Nile Virus, Ebola, and Measles.

3. How can I request a presentation?

Presentation requests can be made online using the Community Request Form at <https://redcap.link/n8cc9t0w> or by scanning the QR code on the right. Presentations are fulfilled on a first come first served basis.

Requests must be submitted at least 3 weeks before the event and cannot be made more than 3 months in advance. Allow 7 - 10 business days to process the request. Submitting a request does not guarantee a presenter can attend your event.
