Real Talk about Real-Time STD/HIV Data Matching & Integration: Barriers and Solutions

Early syphilis diagnosis opens the door to opportunities for HIV prevention, allowing health departments to facilitate HIV testing, PrEP, and linkage to care for syphilis patients and their partners. Current laws allow data sharing between local STD and HIV programs to ensure continuity of care and case management. If we are to prioritize our limited public health resources to focus disease intervention efforts on those clients at highest risk, "real-time" data matching (e.g., surveillance confirmed HIV status and/or lapse from HIV care for patients reported with early syphilis) is necessary to initiate public health follow-up. This workshop will clarify program expectations for STD/HIV integration, explore the practical reality of data sharing at the local level, and identify best practices and potential solutions to improve upon a data-informed client interaction.

Six Degrees of Separation or Less Across the SF Bay Area? What We Know or Don't Know about Syphilis Networks

Developing effective syphilis control strategies in California remains an urgent STD program priority. In the San Francisco (SF) Bay Area Region, SF bears a significant burden of cases in the SF Bay Area region. However, surrounding counties were also seeing concerning increases in syphilis morbidity. Limited data sharing functionality and siloed surveillance systems pose a barrier to counties "seeing" beyond their borders and understanding how they both contribute to and are impacted by syphilis transmission in the surrounding region. This session will include a presentation from SF that shows how surveillance and partner services data were used locally to identify a "mega" network of syphilis cases. This will be followed by a presentation from the state STD Control Branch that expands upon the information from SF by incorporating surveillance and partner services data for the surrounding Bay Area counties. The resulting regional sexual network suggests the potential value in sharing case and partner investigation data across jurisdictional boundaries to interrupt transmission. The discussion will cover challenges in the SF implementation of network-based partner services as well as state-level policies governing interjurisdictional access to STD surveillance data.

Cultural Humility with MSM

Harm Reduction 101: Approaching Syphilis Prevention for People Who Use Drugs

People who use drugs are at increased risk for a variety of poor health outcomes, including STDs, HIV/AIDS, and viral hepatitis. In California, we are seeing this risk borne out in syphilis and congenital syphilis cases among women who are often identified as being homeless and using methamphetamine. A harm reduction approach to working with these communities can help begin to build bridges of trust and cooperation with individuals who use drugs and local service organizations. In this breakout session, we'll discuss the basics of harm reduction, the principles that underlie this approach, and how this approach can be applied to syphilis prevention efforts.

The point of entry into the correctional system serves as a prime opportunity to detect and treat sexually transmitted diseases in traditionally medically-underserved populations, as well as interrupt the transmission of infections to the community -at- large. In this session we will hear from several local health jurisdictions about their current work with corrections around syphilis prevention and control, and will discuss the challenges, strategies, and best practices that are involved with working in correctional settings.
