### How do I protect myself?

### Tip #1: Use condoms.

Condoms stop syphilis from spreading by preventing contact with sores. Touching sores that aren't covered can still spread syphilis.

### Tip #2: Avoid alcohol and drugs.

Drinking alcohol and using drugs can lead to unsafe sex. Avoiding alcohol and drugs can help prevent spreading syphilis.

### Tip #3: Talk to your sexual partner(s).

It's not always obvious that a sex partner has syphilis because syphilis sores can be hidden. Unless you know that your sex partner(s) has been tested and treated, you can be at risk.

### Tip #4: Get tested regularly.

If you have more than one sexual partner, get tested every 6 months. Syphilis is curable.

# Syphilis:

### What Men Who Have Sex with Men (MSM) Need to Know



### What is syphilis?

Syphilis is a sexually transmitted infection (STI) caused by bacteria (germs). Many of its signs and symptoms are the same as other diseases.

### How does syphilis spread?

Syphilis is passed from person-to-person during vaginal, anal or oral sex. It can also pass through skin-to-skin contact with a syphilis sore. Pregnant people with syphilis can also pass the disease to their unborn child during pregnancy.

### What are the signs of syphilis?

Syphilis has different stages with different signs. Many people who have syphilis don't have signs for years.

- Primary syphilis: A painless sore on, around, or inside the penis, vagina, mouth, or anus that sometimes lasts 2-6 weeks and disappears by itself.
- Secondary syphilis: A contagious rash may appear on the body, hands, and feet. These symptoms may come and go for about 1 year.
- Latent syphilis: Symptoms usually go away by themselves, and the person is no longer contagious to sex partners.
- Tertiary syphilis: This stage is very rare.
   Symptoms are more sever and cause serious damage to your body's organs.

### How is syphilis treated?

Syphilis is easily treated and cured with antibiotics. This medicine is given as a shot. Make sure both you and your sex partner(s) complete the treatment before having sex again.



Fact #1: In 2019, 48% of MSM with syphilis reported meeting sex partners on the internet.




Fact #2: In 2019, 63% of MSM with syphilis reported having anonymous sex.
