# **MEASLES LABORATORY TESTING GUIDANCE**

## Appropriate Clinical Specimens for Laboratory Testing\*

	Throat/Nasal/NP Swab <sup>+</sup>	Urine <sup>+</sup>	Serum
PCR <sup>§¶</sup>	Yes	Yes	
IgM or IgG Serology			Yes

\* Only patients with symptoms consistent with measles will be considered for PCR or IgM testing.

- <sup>+</sup> Collection of both a respiratory swab and urine within 2 weeks of rash onset improves the odds of detecting viral RNA. <sup>§</sup> PCR is the preferred method for confirming an acute case.
- <sup>1</sup> Sequencing will be performed on PCR-positive specimens to determine viral genotype.

#### Throat (Oropharyngeal), Nasal or NP Swab

- Collect within 2 weeks of rash onset.
- Use a sterile synthetic swab (e.g., Dacron). Place swab into *liquid* viral or universal transport medium.
- Throat swab is the preferred respiratory specimen.
  Vigorously swab tonsillar areas and posterior nasopharynx with sterile Dacron swab.
- Nasopharyngeal swab: firmly rub nasopharyngeal passage with sterile Dacron swab.

#### <u>Urine</u>

- Collect 10-50 ml urine in a sterile container.
- Collect from the first part of the urine stream, within 2 weeks of onset. The first morning void is ideal.
- Process the urine by centrifuging at 500-600 x g for 10 minutes at 4°C. Resuspend the pellet in 2-3 ml of viral transport medium. If processing is not possible, the entire sample should be stored and shipped at 2°-8°C by overnight delivery service.

# Serum IgM or IgG testing

- Collect 7-10 ml of blood in a red top or serum separator tube. Capillary blood (finger or heel stick) can be used for pediatric patients, if necessary; at least 3-5 capillary tubes are needed.
- The optimal time for collecting acute blood is at least 72 hours after rash onset. Serum collected before then may be falsely negative, but can be tested.
- If initial IgM testing is negative in an unvaccinated person and measles is strongly suspected, a second serum sample and specimens for PCR should be collected.
- IgG testing can be done on case contacts to determine prior exposure to the virus.

#### Specimen storage and shipping

- Store all specimens at 4°C and ship on cold pack within 24 to 72 hours.
- For longer storage, process serum and urine. Store and ship at -70°C or colder.

## Specimen shipment

- Complete the VRDL general specimen submittal form for each specimen (<u>http://tinyurl.com/VRDLLab300</u>).
  - Indicate if the specimen(s) is from a suspect case OR from a contact (for IgG testing only).
  - For a suspect case, include date of rash onset and whether person is linked to a confirmed case.
  - For a recent vaccine recipient, indicate date of vaccination.
- Send submittal form by secure email to <u>VRDL.submittal@cdph.ca.gov</u> and include hard copy with specimens.
- Email package tracking number to expedite processing.
- Measles specimens should be packaged separately from other specimens sent to CDPH for testing.
