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FOREWORD

We are pleased to present the Los Angeles Health Overview of a Pregnancy Event (LA HOPE) Project 2010 - 2012 Data Book. This report is published by the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (DPH) to describe the key indicators of health for mothers who have recently suffered a fetal or infant loss in Los Angeles County.

The Los Angeles Health Overview of a Pregnancy Event (LA HOPE) Project is a public health surveillance project developed in 2006 by the Maternal, Child, and Adolescent Health Programs of DPH. The LA HOPE Project collects countywide population-based data on the attitudes and experiences of women before, during, and shortly after they have suffered a fetal or infant loss. The goal of the LA HOPE Project is to provide data for county health officials and community partners to use in order to make decisions designed to improve the health of mothers and infants in Los Angeles County, to improve the grief and bereavement support services offered to them, and to reduce infant mortality and morbidity.

This report identifies health disparities for women who experienced a fetal or infant loss by race/ethnicity and geographic areas. Comparison data from 2010, 2011 and 2012 are included to highlight trends in factors contributing to infant and fetal loss. For example, in examining the indicators for pre-pregnancy health and health access, Latinas were more likely than any other group to be uninsured prior to pregnancy. Uninsured women reported more difficulty accessing medical care and had lower rates of receiving preventive health screenings compared to insured women. African American women had the highest rate of previous preterm birth. The prevalence of being overweight or obese was approximately 56% between 2010 and 2012. Disparities in these factors are often related to increased health risks and illness for expectant mothers.

Multi-faceted strategies are needed to eliminate the health disparities identified by this report and to promote prevention and quality health care for all women and infants. Both bold and incremental policy changes are needed to address social health and environmental disparities. The areas of need highlighted in this report are intended to inform advocacy groups, community-based organizations, civic programs, funders, and state and local government and other key stakeholders in outlining a plan of action. Collaborative efforts are in progress to improve the health status of women of reproductive age, infants, families, and communities. DPH is currently organizing trainings that incorporate protective factors to help build stronger families and communities, such as, social connections, resilience, social and emotional competence, and healthy relationships.

Thanks to the dedicated County staff, our community partners, and funding from California Department of Public Health, Maternal, Child and Adolescent Health Programs, we are now able to present this report to you.

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About LA HOPE

The Los Angeles Health Overview of a Pregnancy Event (LA HOPE) Project is a public health surveillance project initially developed by the Maternal, Child, and Adolescent Health (MCAH) Programs of Los Angeles County (LAC) in 2006. The LA HOPE Project collects countywide population-based data on the attitudes and experiences of women before, during, and shortly after they have suffered a fetal or infant loss.

The overall purpose of the LA HOPE Project is to reduce infant morbidity and mortality and to promote maternal health by improving maternal and child health programs, policies, and maternal behaviors during pregnancy and early infancy. LA HOPE provides data for county health officials and community partners to use in order to make decisions designed to improve the health of mothers and infants in LAC and to improve the grief and bereavement support services offered to them.

Highlights from 2010 through 2012 data:

- Twenty-nine percent of mothers did not have health insurance just before pregnancy. Thirty-four percent of Latina mothers were uninsured in the months before getting pregnant.
- Sixty-seven percent of mothers did not receive preconception health counseling. Seventy-five percent of African American mothers did not receive preconception health counseling.
- Half of mothers (50%) did not take a **multivitamin/folic acid** daily in the month before conception.
- More than half of mothers (56%) were overweight or obese just before pregnancy. This was higher for African American mothers (65%) compared to Asian/Pacific Islander mothers (34%).
- Almost 25% of mothers suffered from previous miscarriages. Twentyeight percent of White mothers suffered from a previous miscarriage.
- Most mothers (94%) received early **prenatal care** (entered prenatal care during the first trimester).
- Thirteen percent of mothers had **high blood pressure** during pregnancy.
- Twenty-one percent of White mothers reported drinking alcohol during pregnancy, compared to 9.8% overall. Thirteen percent of African American mothers reported smoking cigarettes during pregnancy, compared to 4.4% overall. This, however, does not take into account whether or not pregnancy status was known.

- Near half (47%) of mothers reported feeling depressed during pregnancy and 50% of mothers reported having postpartum depression.
- About 5% of mothers reported being homeless during pregnancy.
 African American mothers reported the highest prevalence of homelessness during pregnancy (13.1%).
- Twenty-eight percent of African American mothers perceived their neighborhood as unsafe, compared to 18.6% overall.
- Forty-five percent of African American mothers reported ever experiencing **discrimination** due to their race/color, compared to 17.7% overall.
- Eighty-two percent of mothers were offered materials on grief and bereavement.

Use of 2010 - 2012 LA HOPE Data Book


This data book represents the combined findings from the 2010, 2011, and 2012 LA HOPE Project. A random stratified sample of mothers experiencing infant or fetal loss was drawn each year. Between 2010 and 2012 a total of 963 eligible respondents participated in the LA HOPE project. These women represent the approximately 4,000 fetal and infant losses that occurred in LAC between 2010-2012. The data are weighted by the respondents' selection probability, which allows the percentage (prevalence) reported in this document to represent the entire population of infant and fetal deaths in LAC in the years 2010, 2011, and 2012.


The 2010-2012 LA HOPE data book covers a wide range of health topics, organized into five sections - preconception health (health before pregnancy), prenatal care and maternal medical conditions during pregnancy, psychosocial conditions during pregnancy, behavioral risk factors, postpartum care, and grief and bereavement support. Each section of the report contains tables displaying estimates by Race/Ethnicity and Service Planning Area (SPA). In every table, County-level estimates are provided so that comparisons may be made between subpopulations and the County total.

The LA HOPE Project recommends readers to review the Technical Notes section of this report, which includes methodology and details of the sampling, data weighting, response rate, strengths/limitations of the data, and a glossary of maternal/infant health terms.

The current report presents the most accurate data to date and replaces previous versions of the LA HOPE data book.

³Question asked: Just before you got pregnant with your new baby, how did your husband or partner feel about you becoming pregnant? Respondents who answered, "He wanted me to be pregnant later" or "He didn't want me to be pregnant then or any time in the future" were coded as "Unwanted pregnancy by partner." Respondents who answered, "I don't know" or "I didn't have a husband or partner" were coded missing for this field.

⁴Question asked: Before you got pregnant, were you doing anything to keep from getting pregnant? Respondents who answered "Yes, all the time" or "Yes, sometimes" were coded as "Using birth control before getting pregnant."

Those who responded "no" to any of the first six items were recoded as "PHS guidlines not met."

⁶Question asked: During your pregnancy, did you have any of these problems? Respondents who answered "problems with placenta (such as abruptio placentae or placenta previa)" were coded as "Problems with the placenta."

⁷Question asked: During your last pregnancy, did you do anything to prevent preterm or early labor? Respondents who answered "yes" to "Doctor sewed my cervix closed (cerclage of incompetent cervix)" were coded as "Incompetent cervix."

⁸Question asked: During your last pregnancy, about how many hours a day, on average, were you in the same room with someone who was smoking? Respondents who indicated more than 0 hours were coded as "Exposed to secondhand smoke."

⁹Respondents who answered "yes" when questioned about use of marijuana, hashish, tranquilizers, hallucinogens, cocaine, heroin, amphetamines or prescription drugs not prescribed by their doctors were coded as "Using illegal drugs or drugs not prescribed by a doctor."

¹⁰Question asked: How often did you exercise for 30 minutes or more in the last three months of pregnany; women who were told by a doctor, nurse or health care worker not to exercise were excluded from the denominator to calculate the prevalence of exercise during last three months of pregnancy.

Technical Notes

I. Methods

LA HOPE is an ongoing, population-based survey that surveys women in LAC seven to nine months after they have experienced a fetal or infant loss. Women are selected from infant and fetal death records and contacted by mail. If there is no response to repeated mailings, women are contacted and interviewed by telephone. The survey can be administered in English and Spanish, with translators available for other languages. In addition, grief and bereavement resources and a \$25 gift certificate are provided with each mailed survey regardless if mothers chose to participate.

II. Sampling

The 2010-2012 LA HOPE Project uses stratified random sampling by mother's race and SPA and an over-sample of African American mothers.

III. Data Weighting

To obtain a representative picture of the mothers who experienced a fetal or infant loss in LAC in 2010-2012, the data were weighted by SPA and race/ ethnicity. Specifically, post stratification procedures were used to properly weight the sample and account for the complex sampling frame.

IV. Response Rate

There were 963 mothers who responded to the 2010-2012 LA HOPE survey, resulting in an average adjusted response rate of 52%, based on calculations proposed by the American Association for Public Opinion Research (AAPOR)¹.

V. Statistical Methods

Point estimates and their variances were calculated using the SAS, PROC SURVEYFREQ procedures, (Release 9.3, North Carolina) to account for the complex sample design. In this report, relative standard error (RSE) more than 25% is used as the criterion for determining that the estimate is statistically unstable and therefore may not be appropriate to use for planning or policy purposes.

RSE is calculated by "dividing the standard error of the estimate by the estimate itself, then multiplying that result by 100." For example, if the estimate of cigarette smokers is 20 percent and the standard error of the estimate is 3 percent, the RSE of the estimate = (3/20) * 100, or 15 percent^{2,3}. All missing and unknown response values were excluded from individual calculations where applicable.

VI. Strengths and Limitations

Strengths: LA HOPE is a population-based survey allowing generalization to all women who have experienced fetal or infant loss in LAC.

Limitations: Sample sizes for some subpopulations were too small for precise estimates. If presented, these are indicated by an asterisk. Potential sources of bias include recall and non-coverage biases. Also, the data can only be generalized to LAC residents who experienced fetal or infant loss in 2010-2012.

VII. Glossary

- 1. Unwanted/mistimed pregnancy: Just before becoming pregnant, wanting to be pregnant later (i.e. mistimed) or not wanting to be pregnant then or at any time in the future (i.e. unwanted).
- 2. Preterm Birth: An infant born before 37 weeks of gestation.
- 3. BMI: Respondents were considered to be overweight if their Body Mass Index (BMI) was 25.0-29.9, and obese if their BMI was 30.0 or higher. Respondents' BMI was calculated on the basis of their self-reported prepregnancy height and weight. BMI categories were based on published BMI categories for adults from Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).
- 4. Low Birth Weight: An infant weighing less than 2500 grams or 5 pounds 8 ounces at birth.
- 5. Meeting the PHS prenatal care guidelines: Meeting all the recommendations of the Public Health Service Expert Panel on the Content of Prenatal Care (1989), including having blood pressure measured, urine and blood samples taken, height and weight measured, a pelvic exam, and a health history taken.
- 6. Depressed during pregnancy: Feeling depressed for most of the day for two weeks or longer during pregnancy.
