INTRODUCTION

The second annual CHIP Progress Report provides an overview of Health Agency accomplishments and performance targets for CHIP strategies coordinated through the Departments of Public Health (DPH), Health Services (DHS), and Mental Health (DMH). Of 54 CHIP strategies that Healthy Agency Programs conducted, 53 were on track for 2017, meaning they were on a path to accomplish their annual performance measure targets at the time of reporting.

This report does not capture all the public health work being done by the Health Agency, nor the myriad efforts to improve health throughout Los Angeles County that are led by organizations outside of the Health Agency. Due to the size of LA County – and the enormous number of initiatives – DPH is unable to comprehensively document all of the very important work underway in the County. The report also does not fully reflect the significant contributions made by many Health Agency programs and community organizations that are working as key partners. Instead, DPH has provided links to coalitions in LA County that are working toward the CHIP goals, via the CHIP's website (www.thinkhealthla.org). At the end of the 5-year CHIP period, the final report will summarize Agency achievements resulting from our collective efforts from 2015-2020.
