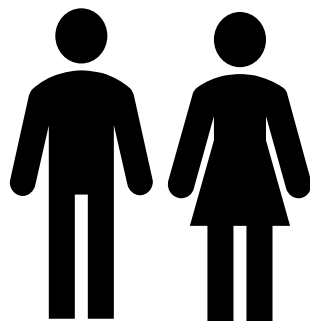

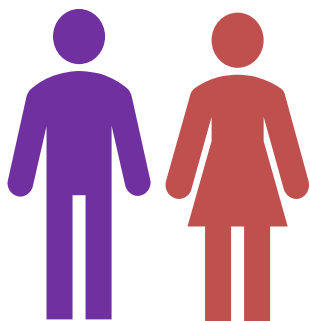

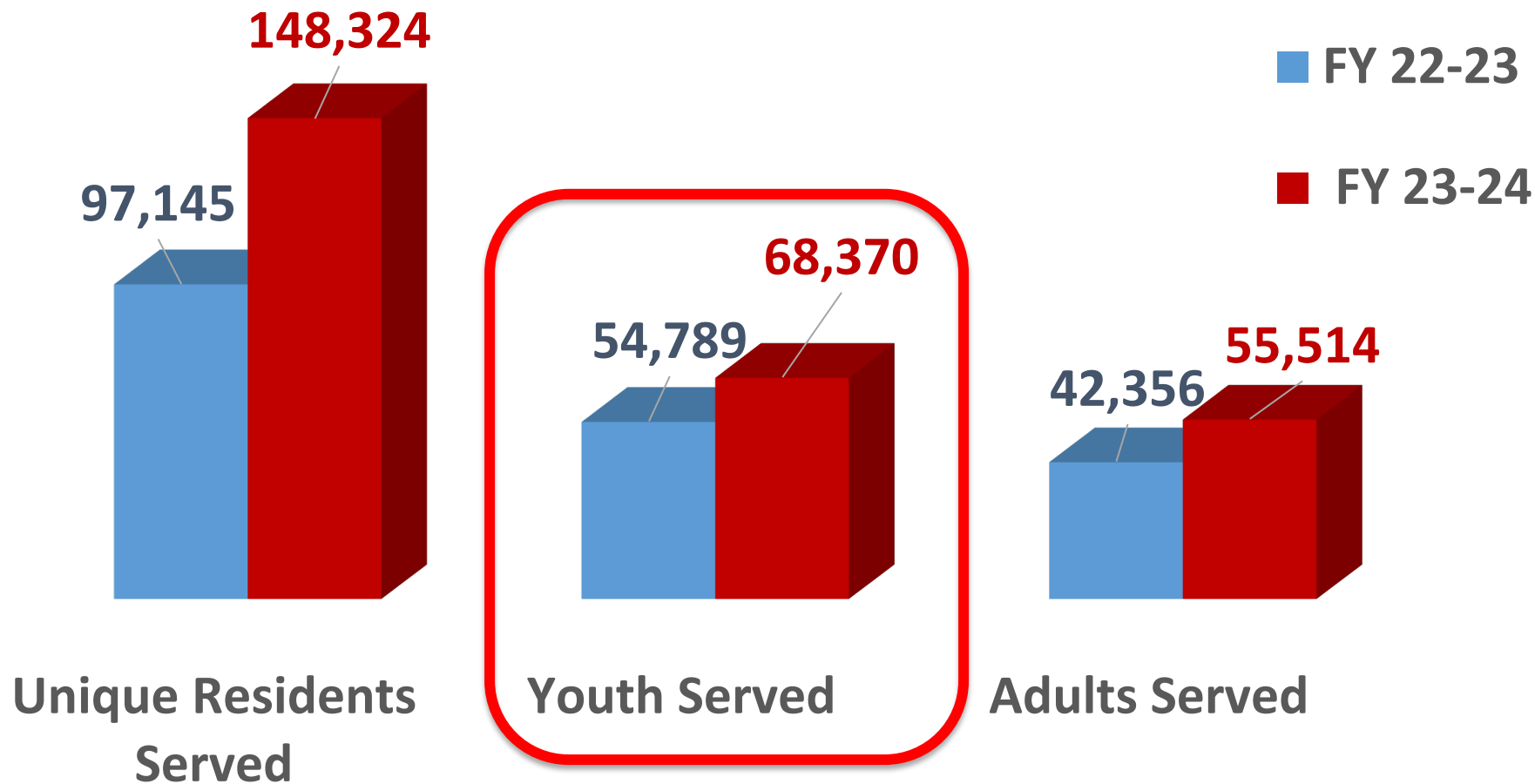



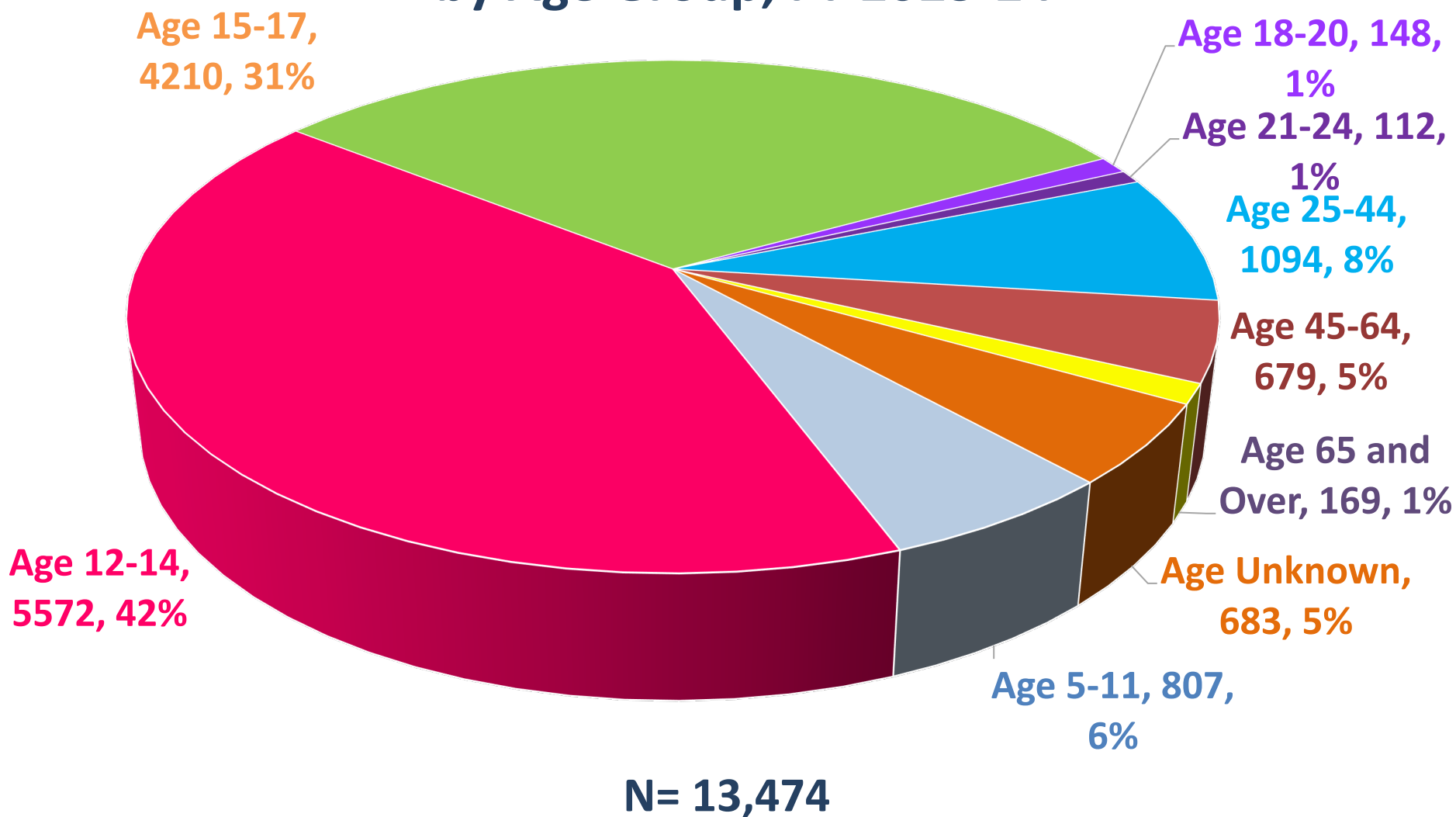

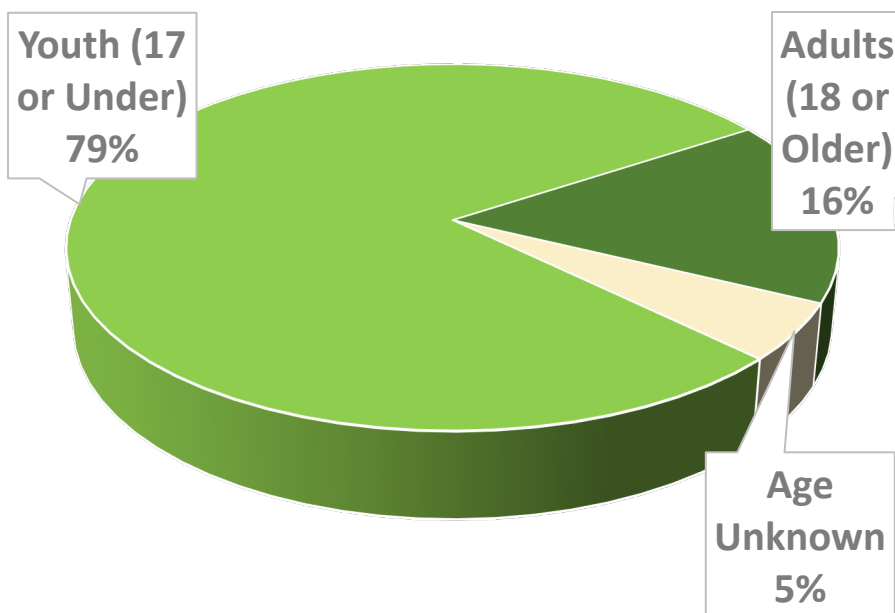

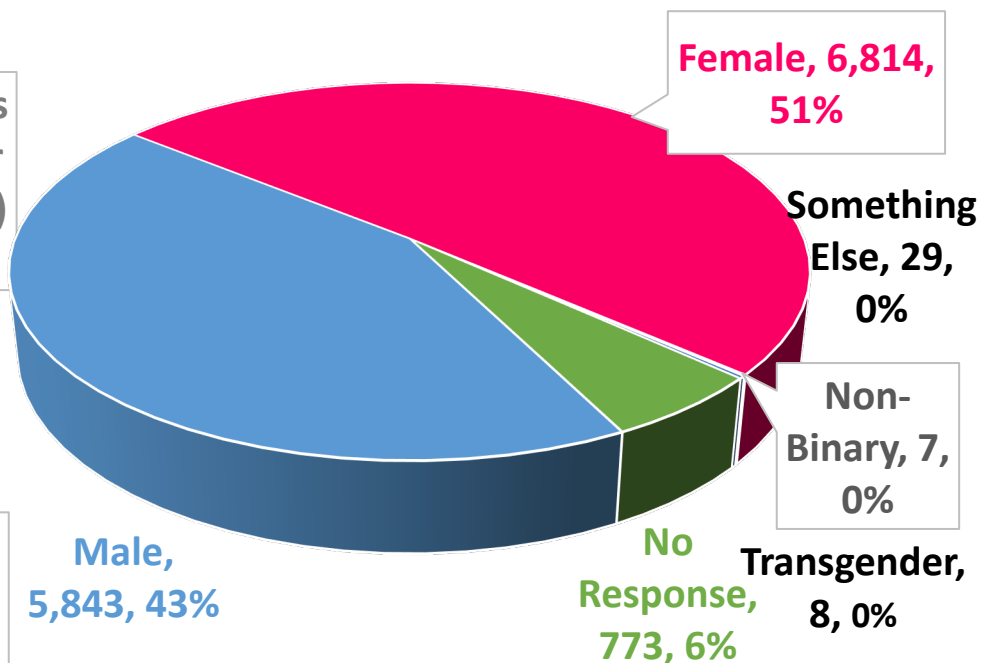

LAC Prevention Recipients, by Gender Identity, FY 2023-24

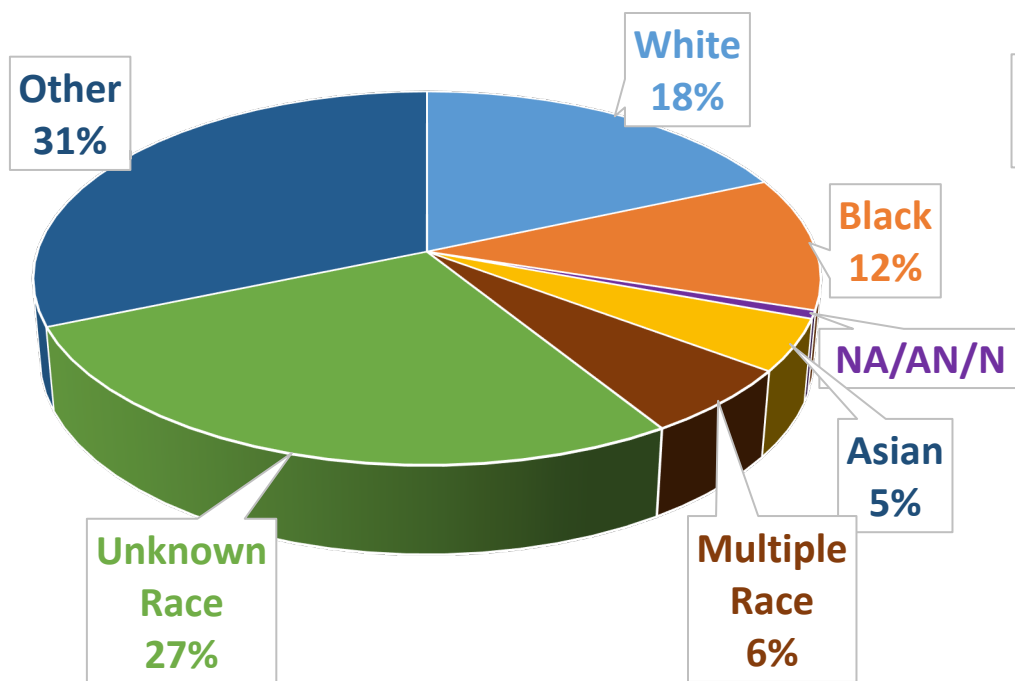

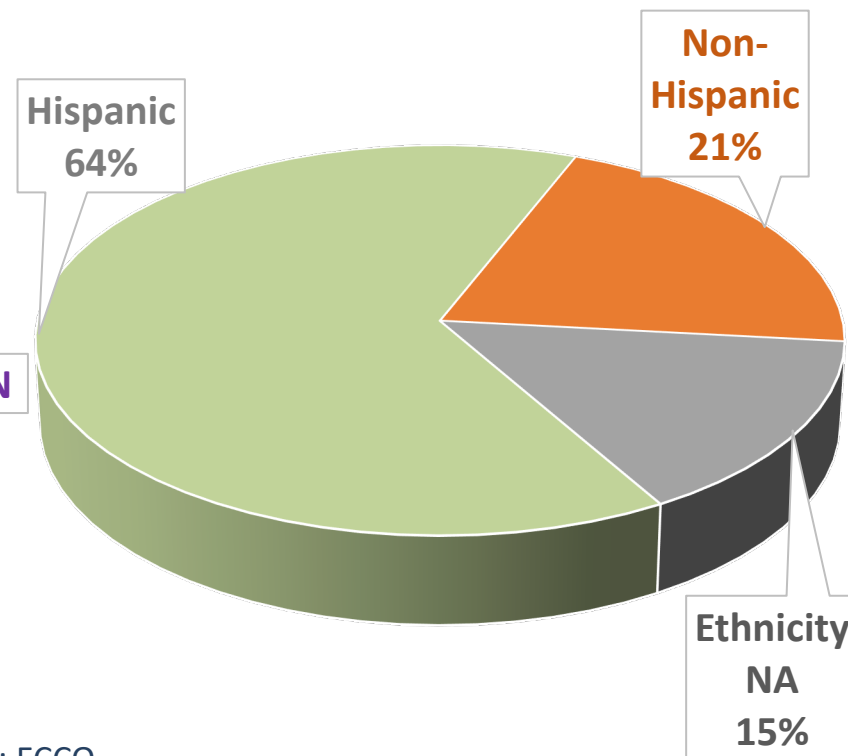


LAC Prevention Recipients, by Race and Ethnicity, FY 2023-34 N=13,474

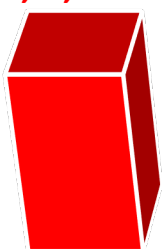

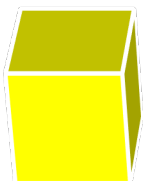

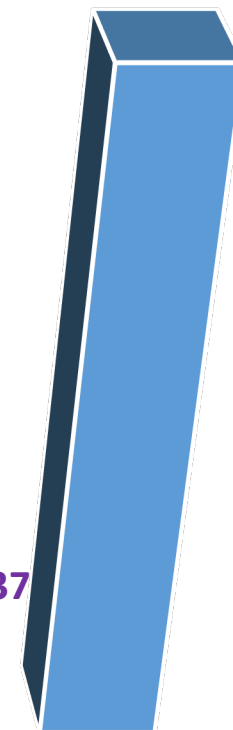

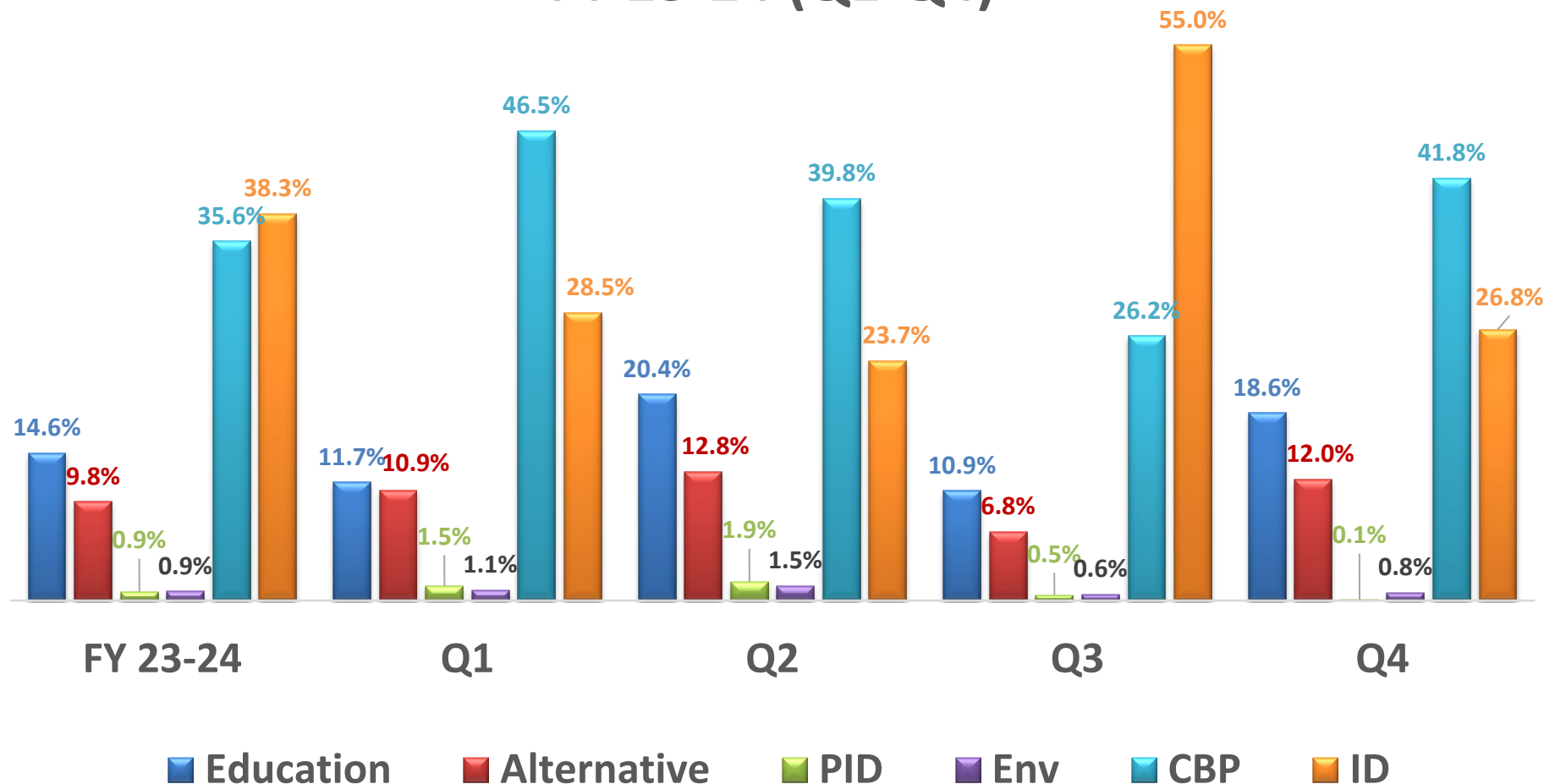

CSAP Prevention Strategies Use, FY 23-24 (Q1-Q4)

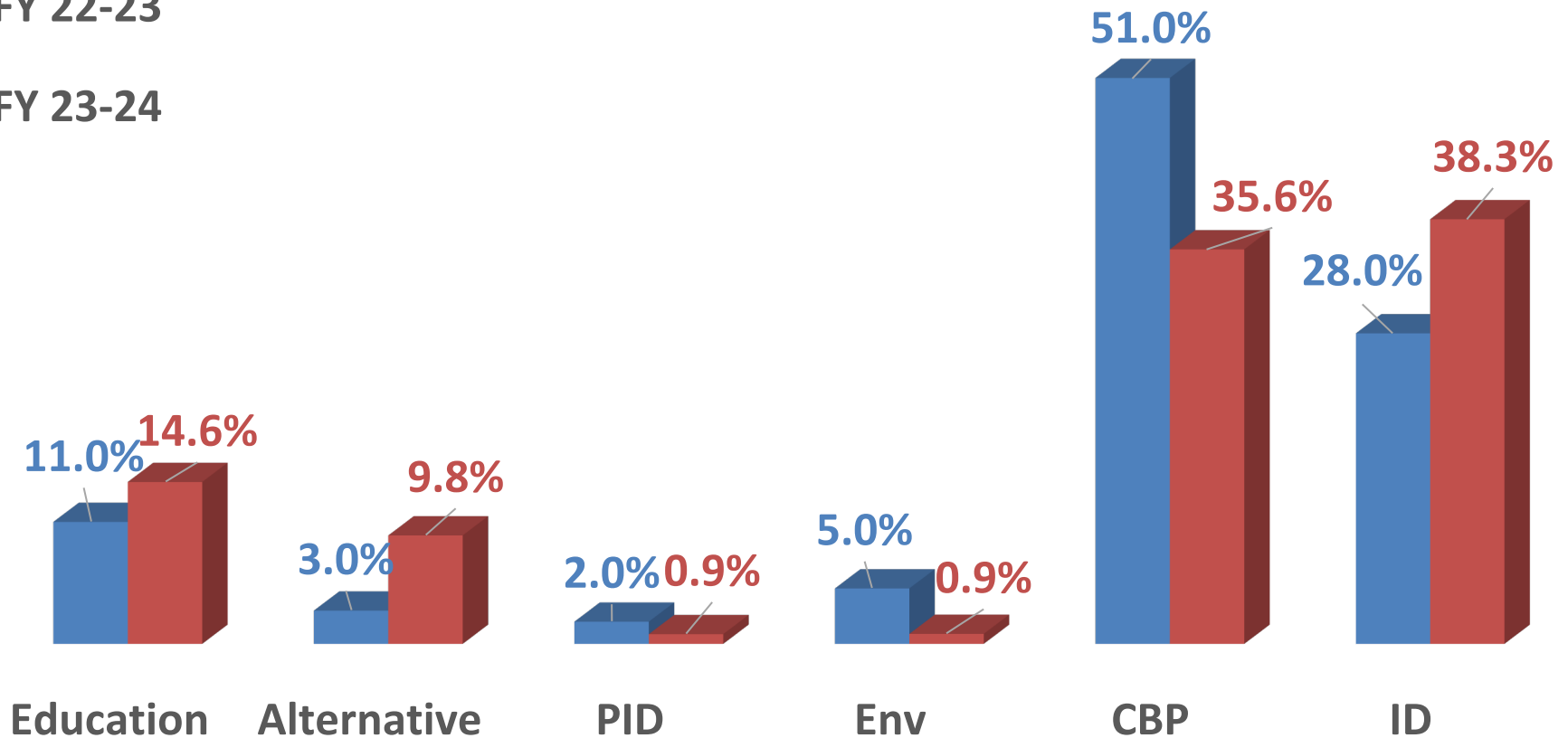




CSAP Strategies Used, by Fiscal Year: FY 22-23 vs. FY 23-24

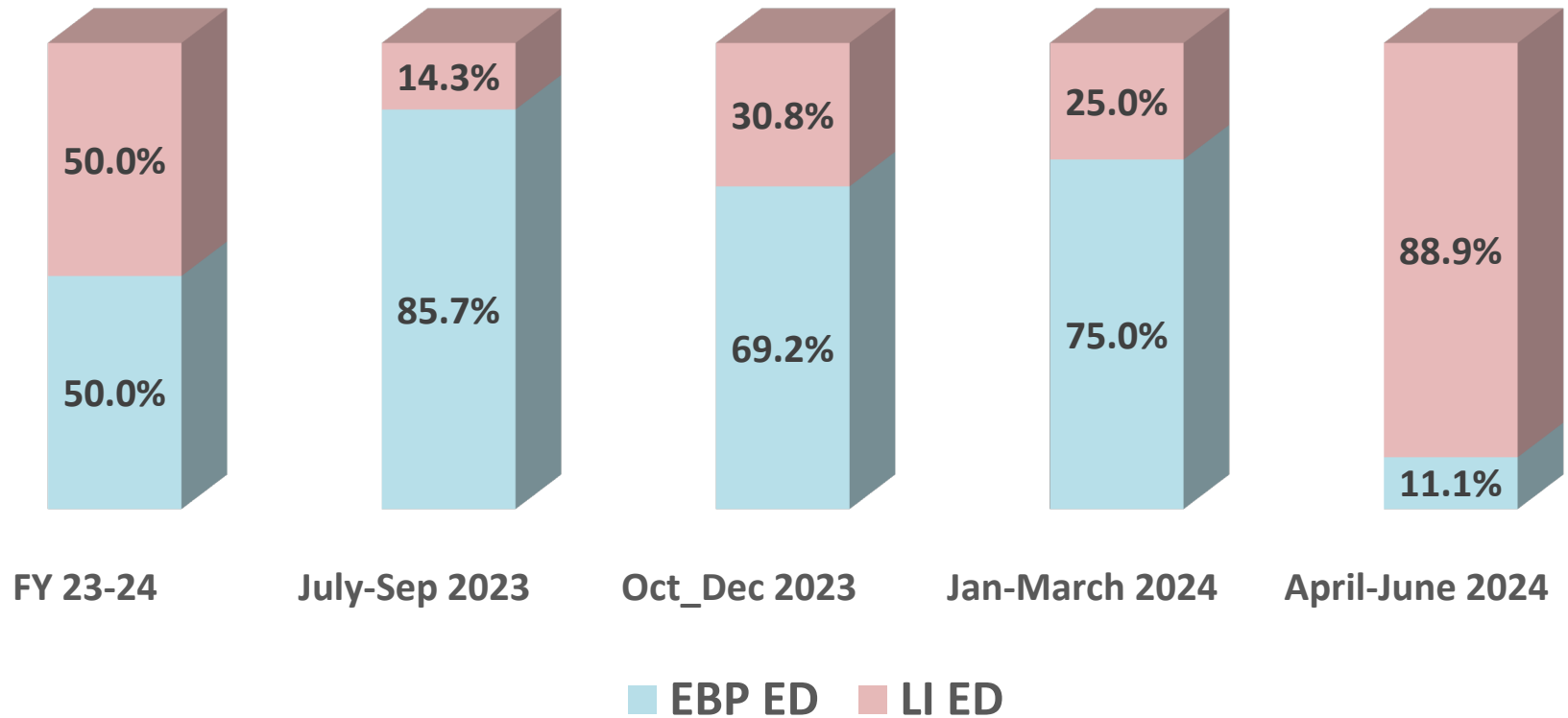

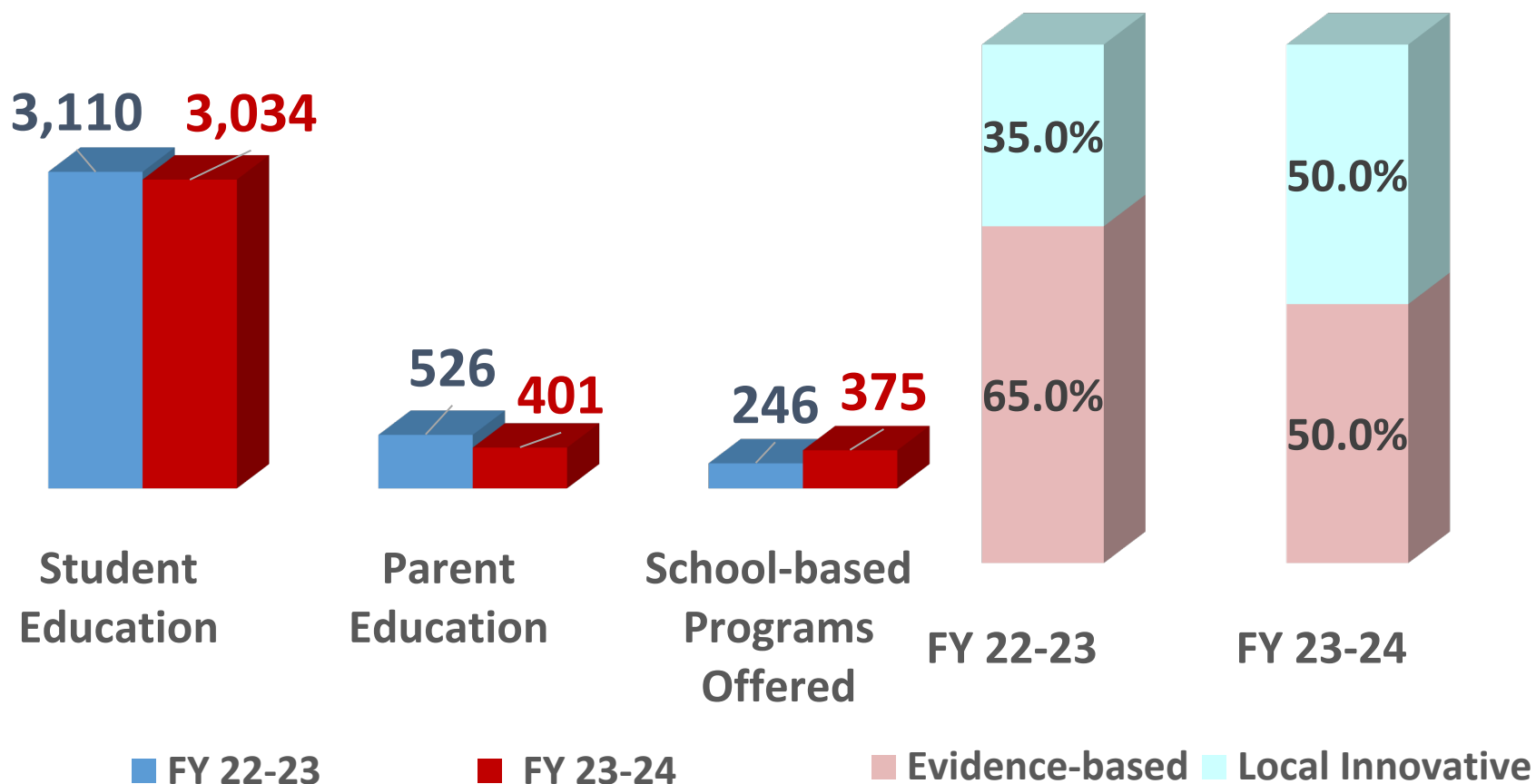

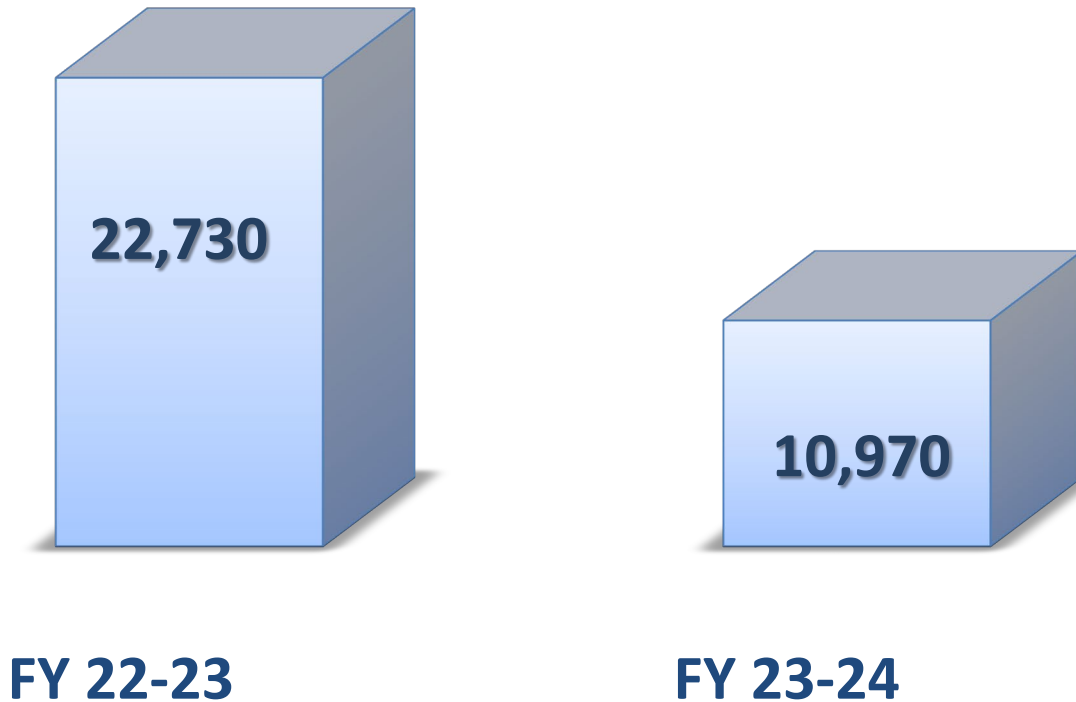

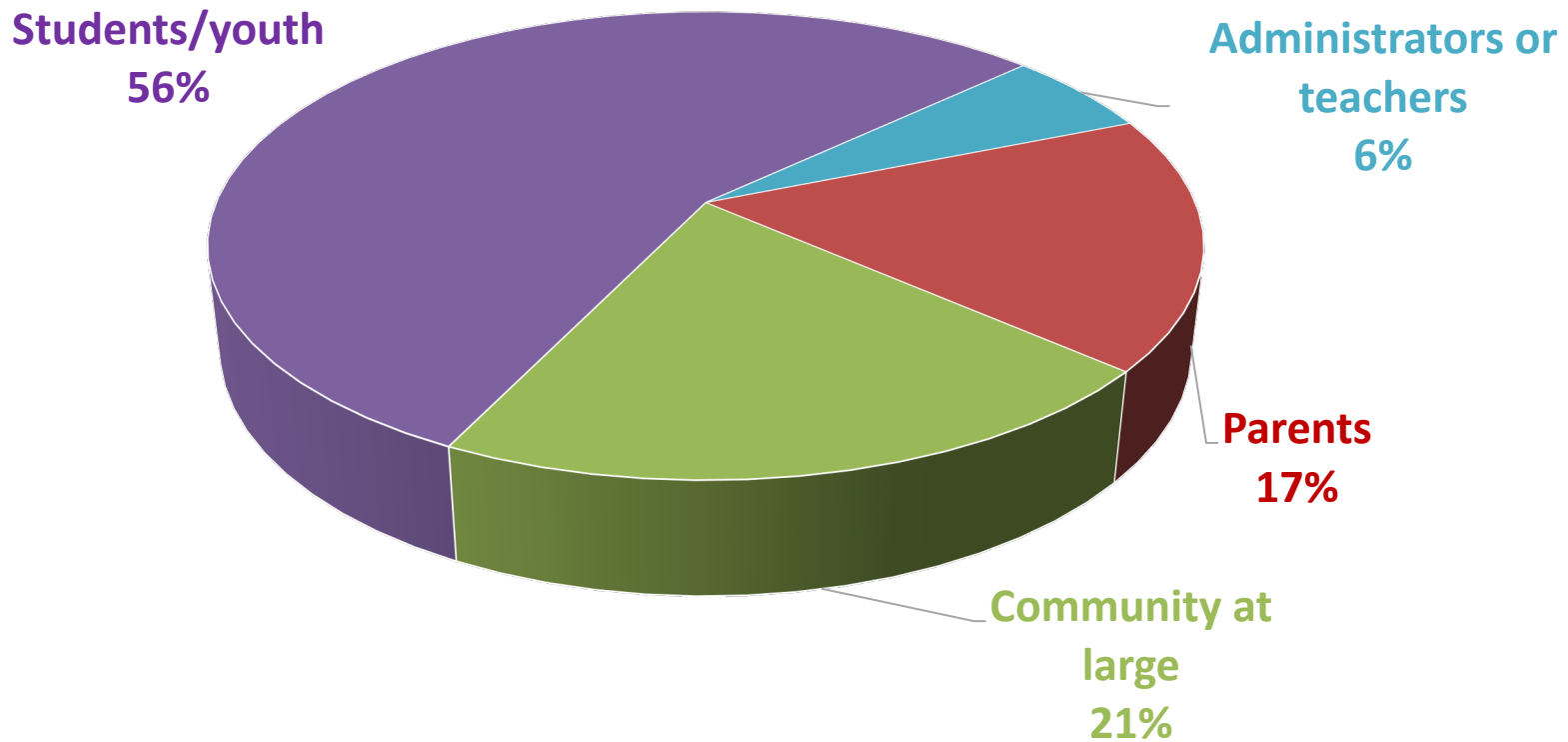


Pounds of Medications Collected DEA Drug Take Back Days, FY 22-23 & FY 23-24

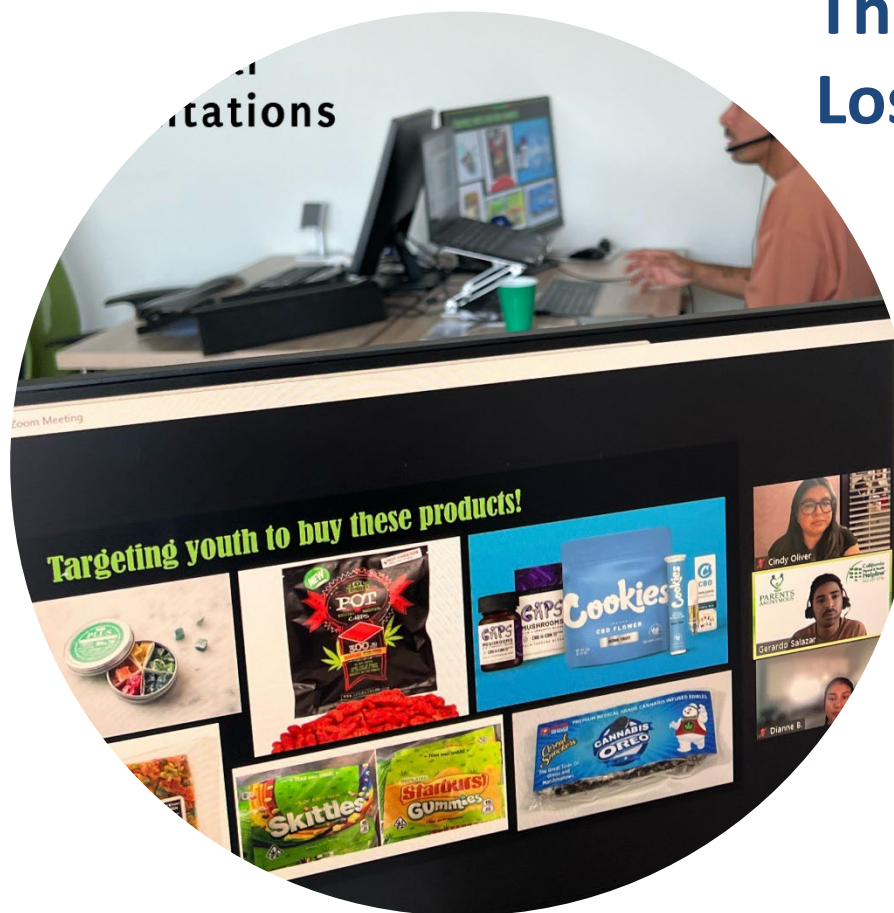

 - **NCADD-ESG/PV: Stanford Tobacco/cannabis Pv Toolkit (6 weeks).**
 - **SFP: Expand LST – youth led Pv initiatives. Restorative practices**
 - **Day One: mentorship/relationship (continued support). Youth advocates**
 - **LST Transitions (high School – 6 weeks)**
 - **Social Model: Started LST w/transitions materials**

- **What other program that your agency implements would you recommend instead of LST? (continued)**
 - SMRS: Boyle Heights HS – Service Learning Program/research as part of a school requirement.
 - Avalon Carver: Winners Sankofa (self-identity, Leadership Development, Shared stories/storytelling)

C.O.R.E Center services

The C.O.R.E Center is part of the Department of Public Health/ Substance Abuse Prevention and Control (SAPC). Our main goal is to provide education on alcohol and drug prevention services to community members.

Prevention

Information on alcohol and drug prevention, and community advocacy opportunities

Workshops

Topics include preventing teen substance use and vaping, understanding health risks of different drugs, substance use disorders, and recognizing signs of relapse.

Screenings

Assessments are conducted to identify treatment needs, and referrals are provided to no-cost treatment services for Medi-Cal clients.

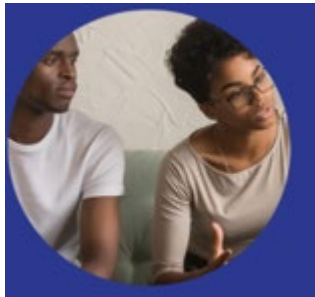

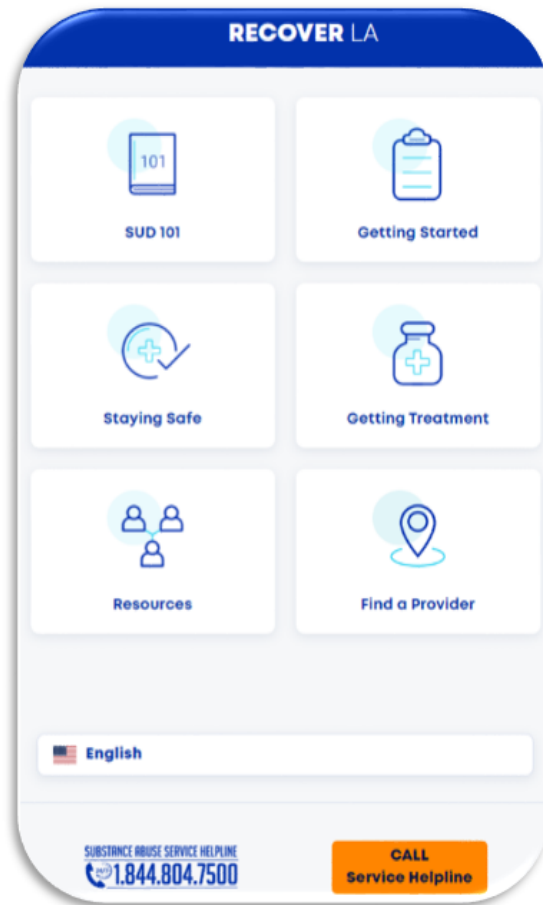
