

## **PUBLIC HEALTH ANALYST**

**Analyze** and interpret data for the development of relevant products, reports, and bulletins that inform community action

**Develop** and disseminate reports about overdose trends and support the development of evidence-based responses

**Share** data relating to overdose spikes with law enforcement and public health officials in the affected areas, enabling them to engage resources and alert the public



## DRUG INTELLIGENCE OFFICER

**Notify** law enforcement agencies when local residents are arrested on felony drug charges in other parts of the state or country


Leverage the DIO network to support drug trafficking investigations, thus reducing exposure of vulnerable individuals to potent substances














## **North Carolina**

- ✓ Developed standardized overdose prevention education curriculum for use in jail setting
- ✓ Recruited and trained three jail educators who will be deployed to jails in three North Carolina counties
- Trained 73 incarcerated individuals on overdose prevention in Haywood County Detention Center
- ✓ Collected pre- and post-overdose prevention education knowledge and attitudes assessments from 52 participants who received the training

Next steps: Expand the training program to Catawba and Cumberland county jails; continue program evaluation activities through focus groups with participants and analysis of pre/post assessments

## **Tennessee**

- Recruited a team of peer navigator specialists to provide 24/7 peer counseling, harm reduction education, and linkage to drug treatment to individuals admitted to the University of Tennessee Medical Center for substance-use related issues
- ✓ Developed a phone application for hospital staff to alert peer navigator specialists to patients in need of services
- ✓ Developed an electronic medical record (EMR) form for peer navigator specialists to track patient interactions
- Developed a single dose buprenorphine protocol to be used in the emergency department (ED)

Next steps: Implement peer navigator specialist program within the hospital and train clinicians to implement the MAT protocol in the ED

## Pilot Projects FY2018-19

To build the evidence base for promising practices in opioid overdose prevention, ONDCP and CDC, through the National Association of County & City Health Officials (NACCHO), funded four High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA) programs and local public health organizations in 5 states to develop and implement communitybased projects designed to reduce overdoses. CDC, in partnership with NACCHO, worked closely with ORS State Teams to ensure successful project implementation, monitoring and evaluation.




# OVERDOSE DETECTION MAPPING APPLICATION PROGRAM

With the recent increases in Opioid related overdoses including fatalities, now is the time to unite our efforts and work together in order to safe-guard the communities we are charged with protecting. Monterey County has already surpassed 2018 totals for opioid related overdose deaths three times! This is an upward trend that should be reversed.

We are encouraging the adoption of a multi-agency overdose response framework using the HIDTA program's Overdose Mapping Application to track overdoses in real-time. This is a no-cost capability offered to our law enforcement and public health agencies that provides us a common operating picture with how our community is being affected by the opioid epidemic. With this information, we are able direct the appropriate resources and raise community awareness to the affected area and to evaluate our strategic response.







#### **Keys To Success**

- Agencies request ODMAP access by signing an electronic form and submitting it to the W/B HIDTA. You can access the webpage by clicking on the OD Response Framework.
- Registration is required and can be accessed by clicking the above ODMAP graphic. Upon successful registration a parking permit and map is emailed.
